



INTRODUCTION

A GREGORIAN Psalm Tone consists of an Intonation, used only in precenting the first Verse of each Psalm, and in each Verse of the Gospel Canticles; two Recitations; and two Cadences, called the Mediation and the Ending.

The notes of the Intonation, Recitations, Mediation, and Ending are sung at the same pace, even when two or more notes are sung to one syllable in certain Endings: except that the final notes of both Mediation and Ending are lengthened as indicated in the music.

All of the words are to be read distinctly, deliberately, smoothly, and naturally: but also evenly, not hurrying little syllables; nor delaying heavy ones, unless two accented syllables occur together, in which case the first is naturally lengthened. The notes of the chant take their rhythm from the words, not the words from the notes.

Single notes written in the chant are never slurred together on a syllable; nor are connected notes in the chant ever divided between syllables. The natural rhetorical accent of the words is always to be kept, unaltered by the music.

The two verses of *Gloria Patri* are sung precisely like the others; without preliminary retard in the preceding Verse or pause after it; and without the use of the Intonation. They may properly be sung full when no Antiphon follows.

The signs used in the pointing are as follows:

The Dot · which is placed before the first syllable of each Mediation and Ending. The singer need only remember that with the syllable following the Dot he leaves the reciting note and begins a cadence.


The Asterisk * which now marks, in the Book of Common Prayer, the central pause in each Psalm Verse, whether read or sung. In singing, this pause should be long enough for a leisurely plentiful breath, and should be rhythmically related to the preceding cadence.

The Flex † always indicates a shorter pause for breath in the first half of a Psalm Verse. It is an ancient custom to inflect the voice on a weak syllable or syllables preceding the Flex. These inflections follow. An accented syllable before the Flex does not change from the reciting note.



Tones I, IV, VI, VII a whole tone down.




Tones II, III, V, VIII a minor third down.



Rules for Chanting the Psalms


- r The Intonation is sung by the Cantor at the same pace as the Recitation; he sings alone through the Mediation: after the Asterisk, the full Choir completes the first Verse. Succeeding Verses are sung alternately from side to side. Gloria Patri may be sung full.
- 2 The Recitation is neither faster nor slower than any other part of the Chant. It is joined to the Cadence without any rhythmical break. Commas in the Recitation are observed only by a very slight prolongation of the previous syllables, not by a break in the tone for breath Willia Almise
- 3 The Flex, a colon, semicolon, period, or question mark indicate the only breaks for breath.
- 4 The syllable following a Dot is sung to the first note of the Mediation or of the Ending as the case may be. Accented syllables after the Dot are normally attracted to notes in the cadences which are marked with accents. Where extra unaccented syllables occur, the parenthetic notes, with stems turned down, will be used, as needed.

5 All phrases should close with a slight diminuendo: this should be more marked when the final syllable is weak.

6 In the Mediations of Tones II, IV, V, VI C, and VIII, the notes following the note marked with an accent are omitted when the first half of the Psalm Verse ends with an accented syllable.




7 In the Mediations of Tones I B, III, VI B, and VII, the abbreviated forms made necessary by unusual combinations of syllables are invariably written out in full, and will be found in footnotes throughout the book.

The present volume, containing the Psalms only, is set forth by direction of the General Convention of 1931. A second part, containing the Canticles at Morning and Evening Prayer, with the Choral Responses, is now under preparation, and will be issued in 1932 in one volume with the Psalms as here printed. Pending the completion of Part II, Canticles are available in a publication called "The Canticles at Evensong."




BLESSED is the man that hath not walked in the counsel of the ungodly, † nor stood in the • way of sinners, * and hath not sat in the seat • of the scornful.

- 2 But his delight is in the · law of the Lord; * and in his law will he exercise · himself day and night.
- 3^1 And he shall be like a tree planted by the \cdot water-side, * that will bring forth his fruit \cdot in due season.
- $_4$ His leaf also \cdot shall not wither; * and look, whatsoever he doeth \cdot it shall prosper.
- 5 As for the ungodly it \cdot is not so with them; * but they are like the chaff, which the wind scattereth away from the \cdot face of the earth.
- 6 Therefore the ungodly shall not be able to · stand in the judgment, * neither the sinners in the congregation · of the righteous.

Why do the heathen so furiously \cdot rage together? * and why do the people imagine \cdot a vain thing?

- 2 The kings of the earth stand up, and the rulers take \cdot counsel together * against the Lord and against his \cdot Anointed:
- 3 Let us break their · bonds asunder, * and cast away · their cords from us.
- 4 He that dwelleth in heaven shall \cdot laugh them to scorn: * the Lord shall have them in \cdot derision.
- 5 Then shall he speak unto \cdot them in his wrath, * and vex them in his sore \cdot displeasure:



- $_3$ My voice shalt thou hear betimes \cdot O Lord; * early in the morning will I direct my prayer unto thee \cdot and will look up.
- 4 For thou art the God that hast no pleasure in wick edness; * neither shall any · evil dwell with thee.
- 5 Such as be foolish shall not stand in \cdot thy sight; * for thou hatest all them that \cdot work iniquity.
- 6 Thou shalt destroy them that speak lies: * the LORD will abhor both the blood-thirsty and deceitful man.

- 7 But as for me, in the multitude of thy mercy I will come into shine house; * and in thy fear will I worship toward thy holy temple.

- 5 For in death no man remembereth \cdot thee; * and who will give thee \cdot thanks in the pit?
- 6 I am weary of my · groaning; * every night wash I my bed and water my · couch with my tears.
- 7 My beauty is gone for very \cdot trouble, * and worn away because of \cdot all mine enemies.
- 8 Away from me all ye that work in iquity; * for the Lord hath heard the voice · of my weeping.
- 9 The Lord hath heard my pertition; * the Lord · will receive my prayer.
- 10 All mine enemies shall be confounded and sore · vexed; * they shall be turned back and put · to shame suddenly.

Psalm 7 Domine, Deus meus Tone I A 1


- O Lord my God, in thee have I put \cdot my trust: * save me from all them that persecute me \cdot and deliver me;
- 2 Lest he devour my soul like a lion and tear it in \cdot pieces, * while \cdot there is none to help.




I will give thanks unto thee O Lord with my · whole heart; * I will speak of all · thy marvellous works.

- 17 The wicked shall be turned to \cdot destruction, * and all the people \cdot that forget God.




- 18 For the poor shall not alway be · forgotten; * the patient abiding of the meek shall not pe·rish for ever.

 - 22 As it was in the beginning, † is now and ever shall be, * world with out end. Amen.




Why standest thou so far off $O \cdot LORD$, * and hidest thy face in the needful \cdot time of trouble?

- 4 The ungodly is so proud that he careth not for \cdot God, * neither is \cdot God in all his thoughts.
- 5 His ways are alway \cdot grievous; * thy judgments are far above out of his sight, and therefore defieth he \cdot all his enemies.
- 6 For he hath said in his heart, Tush, I shall never be cast down, * there shall no harm · happen unto me.
- 7 His mouth is full of cursing, deceit and · fraud; * under his tongue is ungodli·ness and vanity.
- 8 He sitteth lurking in the thievish corners of the · streets, * and privily in his lurking dens doth he murder the innocent; his eyes are · set against the poor.

- 12 He hath said in his heart, Tush, God hath for gotten; * he hideth away his face and he will · never see it.
- 13 Arise O Lord God and lift up thine \cdot hand; * \cdot forget not the poor.
- 14 Wherefore should the wicked blaspheme · God, * while he doth say in his heart, Tush, thou God · carest not for it?

In the Lord put I my \cdot trust; * how say ye then to my soul, that she should flee as a \cdot bird unto the hill?





My heart showeth me the wickedness of the un godly, * that there is no fear of God · before his eyes.



- II Thou sufferedst men to ride \cdot over our heads; * we went through fire and water, and thou broughtest us out in \cdot to a wealthy place.
- 12 I will go into thine house with burnt-offerings, \dagger and will \cdot pay thee my vows, * which I promised with my lips and spake with my mouth, when I \cdot was in trouble.
- 13 I will offer unto thee fat burnt-sacrifices with the · incense of rams; * I will offer · bullocks and goats.



- 17 The chariots of God are twenty thousand, † even thousands of angels; * and the Lord is among them as in the holy · place of Sinai.
- 18 Thou art gone up on high, thou hast led captivity captive, † and received gifts from · men; * yea even from thine enemies, that the Lord God might · dwell among them.
- 19 Praised be the Lord · daily, * even the God who helpeth us and poureth his bene fits upon us.
- 20 He is our God, even the God of whom cometh sal·vation: * God is the Lord, by whom · we escape death.
- 21 God shall wound the head of his \cdot enemies, * and the hairy scalp of such a one as goeth on still \cdot in his wickedness.
- 22 The Lord hath said, I will bring my people again as I did from · Bashan; * mine own will I bring again as I did sometime from the · deep of the sea.
- 23 That thy foot may be dipped in the blood of thine · enemies, * and that the tongue of thy dogs may be · red through the same.
- 24 It is well seen O God how thou \cdot goest; * how thou my God and King, goest in the \cdot sanctuary.
- 25 The singers go before, the minstrels follow \cdot after, * in the midst of the damsels playing \cdot with the timbrels.

- 37 As it was in the beginning, \dagger is now and ever \cdot shall be, * world \cdot without end. Amen.






MORNING PRAYER

- 25 As it was in the beginning, \dagger is now and \cdot ever shall be, * world without end \cdot Amen.




GIVE the King thy judgments \cdot O God, * and thy righteousness un to the King's son.

- 10 Therefore fall the \cdot people unto them, * and thereout suck they no \cdot small advantage.
- II Tush say they, how should \cdot God perceive it? * is there knowledge \cdot in the Most High?
- 12 Lo these are \cdot the ungodly, * these prosper in the world, and these have riches \cdot in possession:
- 13 And I said, Then have I \cdot cleansed my heart in vain, * and washed my hands in \cdot innocency.
- 14 All the day long have \cdot I been punished, * and chastened \cdot every morning.

- 18 Namely how thou dost set them in \cdot slippery places, * and castest them \cdot down and destroyest them.

- 20 Yea, even like as a dream when \cdot one awaketh; * so shalt thou make their image to vanish \cdot out of the city.
 - Abrupt mediation in v. 8, 19, 26.

- 21 Thus my \cdot heart was grieved, * and it went \cdot even through my reins.
- 22 So foolish was \cdot I and ignorant, * even as it were a \cdot beast before thee.
- 23 Nevertheless I am \cdot alway by thee; * for thou hast holden me \cdot by my right hand.
- 24 Thou shalt guide me \cdot with thy counsel, * and after that re ceive me with glory.

- 13 For God is my King of \cdot old; * the help that is done upon earth he do eth it himself.
- 14 Thou didst divide the sea through thy \cdot pow-er; * thou brakest the heads of the dragons in \cdot the waters.
- 15 Thou smotest the heads of leviathan in \cdot pieces, * and gavest him to be meat for the people of \cdot the wilderness.
- 16 Thou broughtest out fountains and waters out of the hard rocks; * thou driedst up migh ty waters.
- 17 The day is thine and the \cdot night is thine; * thou hast prepared the light \cdot and the sun.
- 18 Thou hast set all the borders of the · earth; * thou hast made summer · and winter.
- 19 Remember this O Lord, how the enemy hath re-buked; * and how the foolish people hath blasphemed thy Name.

- to The fierceness of man shall turn to thy \cdot praise; * and the fierceness of \cdot them shalt thou refrain.
- II Promise unto the LORD your God and keep it, \dagger all ye that are round a bout him; * bring presents unto him that ought \cdot to be feared.
- 12 He shall refrain the spirit of \cdot princes, * and is wonderful among the \cdot kings of the earth.
- 13 Glory be to the Father and to the \cdot Son, * and \cdot to the Holy Ghost;
- 14 As it was in the beginning, \dagger is now and ever \cdot shall be, * world \cdot without end. Amen.



I WILL cry unto God with my · voice; * even unto God will I cry with my voice, and he shall hear · ken unto me.

- 2 In the time of my trouble I sought the · Lord: * I stretched forth my hands unto him and ceased not in the night season; my soul refus·ed comfort.
- $_3$ When I am in heaviness I will think upon \cdot God; * when my heart is vexed \cdot I will complain.
- 4 Thou holdest mine eyes \cdot waking: * I am so feeble that \cdot I cannot speak.

- 6 I call to remembrance my \cdot song, * and in the night I commune with mine own heart, and search out \cdot my spirit.




- 7 Will the Lord absent himself for · ever? * and will he be no more · intreated?


Hear my law \cdot O my people; * incline your ears unto the \cdot words of my mouth.

- 4 That we should not hide them from the children of the gene rations to come; * but to show the honour of the Lord, his mighty and wonderful · works that he hath done.
- 5 He made a covenant with Jacob and gave · Israel a law, * which he commanded our forefathers to · teach their children;
- 6 That their posteri ty might know it, * and the children · which were yet unborn;
- 7 To the intent that \cdot when they came up, * they might show their \cdot children the same;
- 81 That they might put their · trust in God; * and not to forget the works of God, but to keep · his commandments;
- 9 And not to be as their forefathers, a faithless and stubborn · generation; * a generation that set not their heart aright, and whose spirit cleaved not sted fastly unto God;
- 10¹ Like as the children of \cdot Ephraim; * who being harnessed and carrying bows, turned themselves back in the \cdot day of battle.
- II They kept not the \cdot covenant of God, * and would not \cdot walk in his law;
- 12 But for gat what he had done, * and the wonderful works that he had · showed for them.
 - ¹ Abrupt mediation in v. 3, 8, 10.



- 13 Marvellous things did he in the sight of our forefathers, in the land of Egypt, * even in the \cdot field of Zoan.
- 14 He divided the sea and \cdot let them go through; * he made the waters to \cdot stand on an heap.
- 15 In the day-time also he \cdot led them with a cloud, * and all the night through \cdot with a light of fire.
- 16 He clave the hard · rocks in the wilderness, * and gave them' drink thereof as it had been out · of the great depth.
- 17¹ He brought waters out of the \cdot stony rock, * so that it gushed out \cdot like the rivers.
- 18 Yet for all this they sinned \cdot more against him, * and provoked the Most Highest \cdot in the wilderness.
- 19 They tempted · God in their hearts, * and required · meat for their lust.
- 20 They spake against God \cdot also, saying, * Shall God prepare a table \cdot in the wilderness?
- 21 He smote the stony rock indeed that the water gushed out, \dagger and the streams \cdot flowed withal; * but can he give bread also, or provide flesh \cdot for his people?
- 22 When the Lord heard · this he was wroth; * so the fire was kindled in Jacob, and there came up heavy displeasure · against Israel;
- 23 Because they be lieved not in God, * and put not their \cdot trust in his help.
- $_{24^{1}}$ So he commanded the \cdot clouds above, * and opened the \cdot doors of heaven.
- 25 He rained down manna also up on them for to eat, * and gave them \cdot food from heaven.
 - 261 So man did eat \cdot angels' food; * for he \cdot sent them meat enough.
- 27 He caused the east-wind to \cdot blow under heaven; * and through his power he brought in \cdot the southwest-wind.
 - ¹ Abrupt mediation in v. 17, 24, 26, 28, 57.

- 28^{1} He rained flesh upon them as \cdot thick as dust, * and feathered fowls like as the \cdot sand of the sea.
- 29 He let it \cdot fall among their tents, * even round about their \cdot habitation.
- 30 So they did eat and were well filled; † for he · gave them their own desire: * they were not disap pointed of their lust.
- 31 But while the meat was yet in their mouths, the heavy wrath of God came upon them, † and slew the · wealthiest of them; * yea and smote down the chosen men that · were in Israel.
- 32 But for all this they \cdot sinned yet more, * and believed \cdot not his wondrous works.
- 33 Therefore their days did he con sume in vanity, * and their years in trouble.
- 34 When he · slew them they sought him, * and turned them early and in quired after God.
- 35 And they remembered that \cdot God was their strength, * and that the High God was \cdot their redeemer.
- 36 Nevertheless they did but \cdot flatter him with their mouth, * and dissembled \cdot with him in their tongue.
- 37 For their \cdot heart was not whole with him, * neither continued they stedfast \cdot in his covenant.
- 38 But he was so merciful that he for gave their misdeeds, * and de stroyed them not.
- 39 Yea many a time turned \cdot he his wrath away, * and would not suffer his whole dis pleasure to arise.
- 40 For he considered that \cdot they were but flesh, * and that they were even a wind that passeth away and \cdot cometh not again.
- 41 Many a time did they provoke him in the wilderness, * and grieved him in the desert.
- 42 They turned \cdot back and tempted God, * and provoked the Holy \cdot One in Israel.
- 43 They \cdot thought not of his hand, * and of the day when he delivered them from the hand \cdot of the enemy;




- 44 How he had wrought his mira·cles in Egypt, * and his wonders in the \cdot field of Zoan.
- 45 He turned their \cdot waters into blood, * so that they might not drink \cdot of the rivers.
- 46 He sent flies among them and de voured them up; * and frogs \cdot to destroy them.
- 47¹ He gave their fruit unto the · caterpillar, * and their labour un·to the grasshopper.
- 48 He destroyed their · vines with hailstones, * and their mulberry · trees with the frost.
- 49 He smote their cattle \cdot also with hailstones, * and their flocks \cdot with hot thunderbolts.
- 50 He cast upon them the furiousness of his wrath, anger, displeasure and trouble: * and sent evil an gels among them.
- 51 He made a way to his indignation, † and spared · not their soul from death; * but gave their life over · to the pestilence;
- 52 And smote all the \cdot firstborn in Egypt, * the most principal and mightiest in the \cdot dwellings of Ham.
- 53 But as for his own people, he led them forth like sheep, * and carried them in the wil derness like a flock.
- 54 He brought them out safely · that they should not fear, * and overwhelmed their en emies with the sea.
- 55 And brought them within the borders of his \cdot sanctuary, * even to this mountain which he purchased \cdot with his right hand.
- 56 He cast out the heathen \cdot also before them, * caused their land to be divided among them for an heritage, and made the tribes of Israel to \cdot dwell in their tents.
- 57 Yet they tempted and displeased the · Most High God, * and kept not his · testimonies.
- 58^2 They turned their backs and fell away \cdot like their forefathers; * starting aside \cdot like a broken bow.
- 1,2,3. The words "grasshopper," "fore-fathers," and "hill-altars" are sung as follows:



- 598 For they grieved him · with their hill-altars, * and provoked him to displeasure · with their images.
- 60 When God heard \cdot this he was wroth, * and took sore displea \cdot sure at Israel;
- 61 So that he forsook the táber·nacle in Shiloh, * even the tent that he had pitch·ed among men.
- 62 He delivered their power \cdot into captivity, * and their beauty into the \cdot enemy's hand.
- 63 He gave his people over also \cdot unto the sword, * and was wroth with \cdot his inheritance.
- 64 The fire con sumed their young men, * and their maidens were not giv en in marriage.
- 65 Their priests were \cdot slain with the sword, * and there were no widows to make \cdot lamentation.
- 66 So the Lord awaked as · one out of sleep, * and like a giant re-freshed with wine.
- 67 He drave his \cdot enemies backward, * and put them to a per \cdot petual shame.
- 68 He refused the táber·nacle of Joseph, * and chose not the · tribe of Ephraim;
- 69 But chose the \cdot tribe of Judah, * even the hill of Sion \cdot which he loved.
- 70 And there he built his \cdot temple on high, * and laid the foundation of it like the ground which he hath made con \cdot tinually.
- 71 He chose David \cdot also his servant, * and took him away \cdot from the sheep-folds:
- 72 As he was following the ewes with their · young he took him, * that he might feed Jacob his people, and Israel · his inheritance.
- 73 So he fed them with a \cdot faithful and true heart, * and ruled them prudent ly with all his power.
- 74 Glory be to the \cdot Father and to the Son, * and \cdot to the Holy Ghost;
- 75 As it was in the beginning, \dagger is now and \cdot ever shall be, * world \cdot without end. Amen.

- O God, the heathen are come into · thine inheritance; * thy holy temple have they defiled, and made Jerusa·lem an heap of stones.
- ² The dead bodies of thy servants have they given to be meat unto the \cdot fowls of the air, * and the flesh of thy saints unto the \cdot beasts of the land.
- 3 Their blood have they shed like water on every \cdot side of Jerusalem, * and there was \cdot no man to bury them.

- 9 Help us O God of our salvation, for the · glory of thy Name: * O deliver us and be merciful unto our sins · for thy Name's sake.
 - 101 Wherefore do the · heathen say, * · Where is now their God?
- II O let the vengeance of thy servants' \cdot blood that is shed, * be openly showed upon the \cdot heathen in our sight.
- 12 O let the sorrowful sighing of the prisoners \cdot come before thee; * according to the greatness of thy power, preserve thou those that are ap-pointed to die.
 - ¹ Abrupt mediation in v. 10.



- 13 And for the blasphemy wherewith our neighbours · have blasphemed thee, * reward thou them O Lord, seven-fold · into their bosom.
- 14 So we that are thy people and sheep of thy pasture, \dagger shall give thee \cdot thanks for ever, * and will alway be showing forth thy praise from generation to \cdot generation.
- 15 Glory be to the \cdot Father and to the Son, * and \cdot to the Holy Ghost;
- 16 As it was in the beginning, \dagger is now and \cdot ever shall be, * \cdot world without end. Amen.



Hear O thou Shepherd of Israel, thou that leadest Joseph \cdot like a flock; * show thyself also, thou that sittest \cdot upon the Cherubim.

- Before Ephraim Benjamin · and Manasseh, * stir up thy strength

- 8 Thou hast brought a vine \cdot out of Egypt; * thou hast cast out the \cdot heathen and planted it.
- 9 Thou \cdot madest room for it; * and when it had taken root \cdot it filled the land.
- The hills were covered with the sha dow of it, * and the boughs thereof were like · the goodly cedar-trees.



- II She stretched out her branches un to the sea, * and her boughs unto the River.
- Why hast thou then broken \cdot down her hedge, * that all they that \cdot go by pluck off her grapes?
- 13 The wild boar out of the wood doth · root it up, * and the wild beasts of · the field devour it.
- 14 Turn thee again thou God of hosts, look · down from heaven, * behold · and visit this vine;
- 15 And the place of the vineyard that thy right · hand hath planted, * and the branch that thou madest · so strong for thyself.
- 16 It is burnt with fire \cdot and cut down; * and they shall perish at the re-buke of thy countenance.

- $_{15}$ I should soon have put \cdot down their enemies, * and turned my hand against \cdot their adversaries.
- 16 The haters of the Lord should have submitted them selves unto him; * but their time should have en dured for ever.
- 17 I would have fed them also with the \cdot finest wheat-flour; * and with honey out of the stony rock would I \cdot have satisfied thee.
- 18 Glory be to the · Father and to the Son, * · and to the Holy Ghost;
- 19 As it was in the beginning, † is now and · ever shall be, * · world without end. Amen.



- 13 So when they cried unto the Lord in their \cdot trouble, * he delivered them \cdot out of their distress.
- 14 For he brought them out of darkness, and out of the shadow of · death, * and brake their · bonds in sunder.
- 15 O that men would therefore praise the Lord for his \cdot goodness; * and declare the wonders that he doeth for the \cdot children of men!
- 16 For he hath broken the gates of \cdot brass, * and smitten the bars of i ron in sunder.
- 17 Foolish men are plagued for their of fence, * and because · of their wickedness.
- 18 Their soul abhorred all manner of \cdot meat, * and they were even \cdot hard at death's door.
- 19 So when they cried unto the Lord in their \cdot trouble, * he delivered them \cdot out of their distress.
- 20 He sent his word and \cdot healed them; * and they were saved from \cdot their destruction.
- 21 O that men would therefore praise the Lord for his · goodness; * and declare the wonders that he doeth for the · children of men!
- 22 That they would offer unto him the sacrifice of thanks giving, * and tell out his · works with gladness!
- 23 They that go down to the sea in \cdot ships, * and occupy their business \cdot in great waters;
- 24 These men see the works of the \cdot Lord, * and his \cdot wonders in the deep.
- 25 For at his word the stormy wind a riseth, * which lifteth · up the waves thereof.
- 26 They are carried up to the heaven and down again to the · deep; * their soul melteth away because · of the trouble.
- 27 They reel to and fro and stagger like a \cdot drunken man, * and are \cdot at their wit's end.
- 28 So when they cry unto the Lord in their \cdot trouble, * he delivereth them \cdot out of their distress.
